FROM THE DESK OF FATHER DOYLE

Dear Parishioners:

Wait for the Lord, be strong, and let your heart take courage; wait for the Lord (Psalm 27:14).

Advent is a season of anticipation. Just as the Israelites were to be on the lookout for the Messiah, so are we to be alert to the appearance of God in our lives and in our world. Of course, once Thanksgiving is over and the retail holidays season revs up; it is easy to forget the presence of God in the focus of this season. Images of Santa Claus, Rudolph the Red Nose Reindeer and Frosty the Snowman can obscure our view of the arrival of Jesus.

But Advent is not just a history lesson. Advent calls us to watch for the arrival of God into our lives now. We may be inclined to watch for dramatic events to herald the presence of God who may indeed speak to us through the protestors on Wall Street, the financial upheaval in Europe, the foreclosure crisis at home and other events. Just as likely, it seems to me, God may arrive in a completely unexpected manner— through a family member or neighbor in need, or through the generosity of a stranger. We would be well advised to be watchful not just for how God might be at work on the world stage, but also for how God might be present in each of our lives.

I generally welcome the season of Advent as a time filled with good cheer and good will. People are a bit nicer to one another, streets, homes and stores are decorated, lights and signs with Happy Holidays and Peace on Earth— warmth amidst the chill of winter.

I don't usually think of Advent as a time when I should be looking to see God at work in my life, my family and my relationships. I don't usually have a sense of heightened expectation that I will experience with the Incarnation in a powerful way. I'm not nearly as watchful and alert as I could be.

Advent 2011 takes place during a time of change in our world in ways that impact each one of us. Jobs and homes are disappearing, fear and anxiety are driving markets and families. Perhaps we can take some time during the next four weeks of Advent to look beyond our headlines and 401k statements, and be alert for the presence of God in our lives.

GETTING IN TOUCH WITH MYSELF THIS ADVENT SEASON

One of the best ways to prepare for the very special season of Advent is to “get in touch with ourselves”. It may sound odd, but one symptom of our contemporary lives is that we can often be quite “out of touch” with what is going on in our very own hearts. We are about to begin our Advent, right at the time our Western culture begins Christmas preparations. It is a busy time, and our heads are filled with details to remember. And, it is a time of emotional complexity that is part of this holiday season—with all of the expectations and challenges of family and relationships who we want to be with and who we struggle to be with. So, our hearts are a bit tender, if not completely defended from experiencing anything deeply. We are about to hear some very powerful and stirring readings from Isaiah, the Prophet. We will re-enter the ancient tradition of a people longing for the coming of a Savior. We may remember the days of our childhood when we longed for Christmas to come, because it was a magical time of receiving gifts. As adults, we have to ask ourselves, “What is it I long for now?” The answer won’t come easily. The more we walk around with that question, and let it penetrate through the layers of distraction and self-protection, the more powerfully we will experience Advent.

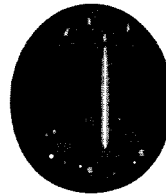

ADVENT WREATH

“Customarily the Advent Wreath is constructed of a circle of evergreen branches on top which are inserted four candles. According to tradition, three of the candles are violet and the fourth is rose. However, four violet candles may also be used” (Book of Blessings, 1510).



The rose candle is lit on the Third Sunday of Advent for this color anticipates and symbolizes the Christmas joy announced in the first words of the Entrance Antiphon; **Rejoice!** For this reason the Third Sunday is also called Gaudete Sunday, and rose color vestments are permitted.

The Advent Wreath represents the long time when people lived in spiritual darkness, waiting for the coming of the Messiah, the Light of the World. Each year in Advent people wait once again in darkness for the coming of the Lord: His historical coming in the mystery of Bethlehem; His final coming at the end of time, and His special coming in every moment of grace.

During Advent, family and friends can gather around the Advent Wreath lighting the appropriate candle(s), read from the daily Advent meditation and sing songs.

THE NEW TRANSLATION OF THE MASS

Today, the first Sunday of Advent, a new translation of the Mass will be used in all Latin Rite Catholic parishes in the English in the United States. These new words represent perhaps the most significant liturgical changes since the revision of the sacraments shortly after the Second Vatican Council. But

while the words will be different than those to which we have grown accustomed, it must also be remembered that the Mass itself will remain the same; its structure and flow will remain as they currently exist.

While change can often be difficult, the new words to the Mass nevertheless gives us all a chance to refocus and to rededicate ourselves to the source and summit of our Faith, the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. The new words present a real opportunity to once again remember just what it is that we do when we gather for the Eucharist. Better yet, it is a chance to remember that it is that *Jesus Christ* does when we assemble.

When the liturgical reforms of the Second Vatican Council were carried out over 40 years ago, one of the most noticeable changes was the language of the Mass. At most parishes and for most Catholics in the United States, the prayers once prayed in Latin were now heard and recited in English. This change of language was carried out with a central goal in mind—the full, active, and conscious participation of all the faithful in the sacrifice of the Mass. While Latin remains the official language of the Latin Rite Catholic Church, the use of the vernacular within the Liturgy is without a doubt the most common experience for most believers, and will certainly remain so well into the future.

The translation of the Latin prayers of the Church in the vernacular is an incredibly important process, and one that requires skill, patience and much prayer. How does one remain faithful to the official Latin text while also trying to effectively communicate eternal truths to a contemporary society? The Church provides guidelines for resolving this question in order to ensure that the translated liturgical texts adequately and accurately convey the meaning of the Latin. In 2011, the Church revised her policies for translating liturgical texts in order to better ensure translations that were as close to the original Latin as possible. The causes behind these change to the principles of translation were varied, but all of them rooted in the desire of the Church to ever more accurately convey the truths communicated and celebrated within the Liturgy.

And so along with new principles came the need to retranslate the various liturgical books accordingly. The new translation of the Mass is but the first new set of many texts we will be receiving in the years to come utilizing a new translation—we'll need a new book for Baptism, for RCIA, and for Marriage, among many others. TO be sure, getting to know these new words will take effort and patience, but soon enough they will become just as familiar and beloved to us as the present words.

ADVENT 2011

Soon it will Christmas Day! But first comes the Season of Advent which begins on Sunday, November 27th. Although a short season of only four weeks; it is a special season of grace often overlooked in our hectic pace of Christmas preparation as American culture brings its celebration at Thanksgiving, if not before!

Yet, the Season of Advent urges us to **Make Room for Jesus**. Perhaps the key is not to do more (or less), but to do what we do in the weeks before Christmas **In the presence of Christ**. It is in Advent preparation that we can announce the true meaning of Christmas: **A Savior has been born to us, Christ the Lord**.

The beauty of Advent is in opening our hearts to the Lord so that like Mary, Jesus can make his home in us; and then, like Mary, we can give birth to Christ in the here and now by our lives of love and acts of service and compassion.

Some Advent events here at Saint Thomas Aquinas:

- **Little Blue Book:** Do you have a Little Blue Book? If not, maybe we can help. Do you have 6 minutes a day? If so, then you have time to pray! As part of our Christmas preparation, we will be offering the "**Little Blue Book**" reflection book to all parishioners for Only **\$2.00** per copy. The little book has a short reflection for each day of Advent for us to meditate and pray over. And it only takes 6 minutes a day!!!
- **Faith Sharing on Advent Scriptures:** As we look ahead to the season of Advent which begins on November 27th, we will offer an opportunity to reflect on the gospels of the Sundays of Advent as a spiritual preparation for the great feast of Christmas. Dear Parishioners:

I am pleased to present our 2010-2011 Annual Financial Report, ending August 31, 2011, as provided to the Diocese of Brooklyn by the accounting firm of Baumann, Dennis & Hochuli, LLP. Please take some time to read and study this report, which will give you a clear picture of our parish financially.

The financial statement that you see includes all of the years that I have been assigned here as Pastor and Administrator; the goal of every parish should be to meet the Ordinary Expenses with the Ordinary Income. Some observations I would ask you to look at:

1. The Collections have decreased from last year approximately \$94.00 a week or a total of \$4,889.50.
2. The Rental Income from the Department of Education has increased to approximately \$645,000.00 a year; in order for us to keep current with our bills, salaries and benefits for our employees, utilities and maintenance of our buildings – we are dependent upon the rental income that we receive to help us meet our expenses..
3. This past year we did no fundraising; but the budget and end of the year statement reflect how our parish organizations help.
4. We have tried to cut our expenses so we will see a decline of approximately \$26,000.00 in Salaries, but there was an increase in Household/Benefits from last year.
5. Other Ordinary Expenses include Fuel; Electricity; Ordinary Repairs on parish buildings; Diocesan Assessment and our commitment to the Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton Trust.
6. With all the work that has been done on the sidewalks, we have been able to meet this expense without having to withdraw any money from our investments.


I ask you to prayerfully consider increasing your regular and monthly offering to our parish so that we do not become dependent upon an unpredictable source of revenue to meet our obligations. The parish will do its part in this endeavor as we continue to look at ways to increase our revenue and decrease our expenses.

Blessed John Paul II reminded us that in the epoch of human history we must reach out to all people and without fear allow the grace of Jesus Christ to draw us all together. This must start within our families and our parish family as well. Some parishioners are very much at home in our church, while others may think that this is just a place that they occasionally visit, but that it belongs to someone else. Through the Sacrament of Baptism, Saint Thomas Aquinas Parish is home to each one of us – it is “ours.”

The Church, the neighborhood, in which we live and minister, technology and the American social structure are constantly changing. Through it all, we continue to seek the sense of the

sacred. Perhaps more than ever, we yearn for a place of refreshment and renewal, a place of serenity where we can step off the fast track or take a breather from the hustle and bustle. The work that continues to be done on all our parish buildings seeks to create an environment which is an expression of our desire to reach out, seeking to draw others in to the love we experience in Jesus Christ.

To all of you who have contributed so generously to the ministries at Saint Thomas Aquinas, thank you and may God continue to bless you.
